When Leslie and I moved from our first apartment to a house that we rented with a yard, we went overboard in planting a garden. There was an 8'x4' raised bed in the backyard. We over planted, underwatered, and ended up feeding the squirrel population in the neighborhood. I'm not sure that anything we ever grew we ever ate. Maybe half of a tomato or something. I can't exactly remember.



What I do remember is that we agreed not to do the same thing the next year. So we didn't. But what I do remember is that before we knew it, things that were dormant for a season were re-emerging from the ground. Despite our best efforts the previous year, new life was breaking forth.

Perhaps there's a reason that Jesus speaks in metaphors using the land and nature around him. One, it was practical. People lived on the land. They knew the commandments that had to do with the land because of the Torah. It was ripe for the picking as far as analogies go. Two, it was there. If you are trying to teach, you reach for the things that are closest for illustrative purposes. Third, it was mysterious. I don't think they had words like photosynthesis or mitochondria. But they did learn from years of passing down information and studying the land.


I probably could ask many of you in the church about botany or plants or gardening and you would explain it better than I ever could seek to understand. But there are things that are still shrouded in mystery, observation, and trial and error.

When Jesus speaks in parables about the land, the disciples need explanation. We need explanation. Because all of the horticulture classes in the world, even all the knowledge available to the human brain, fails to fully comprehend the beauty and wonder and mystery of God. We continue this lifelong journey together. I'll see you Sunday.



UMCOR disaster relief needs boxes of 33-45 gallon heavy duty trash bags and bottles of concentrated liquid household cleaner, 16-40 oz.




A box will be in the Welcome Portal to collect for these two projects through September 1.




Flower Ministry:

Many thanks to the generous people of this church who provided the clothing, toiletry items, and toys for this year's Christmas Shoe Box project. Because of you, this year's project was a huge success. Also, a BIG "thank you" to those of you who helped behind the scenes and who participated in the packing event held on June 15, 2023. After the United Women in Faith Unit Meeting that evening, many stayed behind to pack 108 boxes.



By early next week, Tami Kemberling and I will have delivered these boxes to the North Alabama Conference Disaster Relief Warehouse in Decatur, Alabama. From there, these boxes will carry the strong message that God loves them to children somewhere in Central America. Last year, the Warehouse sent almost 6,000 boxes to Nicaragua, Honduras, Guatemala, and other Central American countries. Churches and other organizations from all over the country participate in this project each year.

Without these boxes, some of the children might not receive Christmas presents. From my trips to El Salvador, I know that some families in these countries barely have enough money to buy food. Clothing is often handme-downs from the clothing mission teams leave. And toys are even harder to come by. These new clothes and the new toys will be treasures for these children. — Maggie Clarke
