Welcome to the third week of our Season of the Nativity Devotional: *Let Heaven and Nature Sing*.

In this holy season, we join heaven and nature as they worship in hopeful expectation of Christ's return, when everything will be made new. Worship, however, is not just confined to singing or going to a worship service. Indeed, because of the gifts of Christ, worship becomes our primary vocation. We become living sacrifices.

We also know this season as Advent. Advent comes from the Latin *adventus*, meaning "coming"—a reminder that we wait not in idleness, but with anticipation and longing.

This time of year is busy, of course; life always seems to be speeding up. Instead of being swept up in the rush, we invite you to pause, to reflect, and to consider how you might join the song that is already rising all around us.

Monday, December 15

"Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker"-Psalm 95:6

A central theme of worship in scripture is adoration. In the beloved Christmas hymn *O Come*, *All Ye Faithful*, we are invited to come and adore Christ the Lord. We may each express that adoration in our own way, but one thing is certain: Christ's presence and grace spark joy and celebration.

On the lines below, take a moment to write about how you adore and celebrate Jesus' presence in your life. Reflect on how Christ is a gift that never breaks, never wears out, and never becomes obsolete.

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Tuesday, December 16

"The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; Those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them light has shone. You have multiplied the nation; you have increased its joy; They rejoice before you as with joy at the harvest, as they are glad when they divide the spoil." -Isaiah 9:2-3

Having an illuminated path makes all the difference. Living with God doesn't mean we always know where we're going or what lies around the corner, but it does mean our lives are filled with a steady, everpresent light and support.

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Wednesday, December 17

Friday, December 19

Saturday, December 20

We are all walking a life path—some of us still finding our footing, others moving along well-worn trails. During the Season of the Nativity, we're invited to pause and reassess how we are living in light of the promise that Jesus' return will one day make all things new. Because of that hope, we don't wait passively; we begin living into those good things even now.

Take a moment to pray. Ask God to show you how you might live today a little differently than yesterday. Ask for the grace to be intentional—more attentive to God's presence, more aligned with the future God is creating, and more willing to walk in the light that leads home.
