An Inside Look at Confirmation at FFUMC

"So God created humans in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them."

Genesis 1:27, NRSVUE

A high school teacher recently posed a deceptively simple question to her students: Are human beings basically good or basically bad? To her surprise, most of the class landed firmly on the pessimistic side. Humanity, they said, is inherently bad.

This question sits at the heart of our confirmation conversations with middle school students because it is one of the most basic—and most urgent—questions the biblical writers are wrestling with. Who are we, really? And to what extent can we be made new by God's love and grace?

It's easy to see why so many people assume the worst about humanity. Turn on the news or scroll the headlines, and you're met with violence, exploitation, cruelty, and environmental devastation. The evidence of human brokenness is everywhere. But scripture refuses to let us settle for a simple answer. Faithfulness in a despairing world means telling the fuller truth: we are neither purely good nor irredeemably bad.

The Bible begins not with condemnation, but with blessing. Humanity is created in the image of God and declared good.

Sin enters the story in Genesis 3, not as proof that humanity is worthless, but as a description of our brokenness. As our confirmation curriculum puts it: "Sin is our brokenness, our separation from God, our fractured world, and our need of healing." In the sermon New Birth, John Wesley suggests that sin strikes at the moral center of our lives. When that center is distorted, life becomes disordered. Apart from grace, the damage is deep and far-reaching.

So how can we be healed?

The Christian story answers with grace—grace that forgives and grace that transforms. Justification is God's decisive act of forgiveness through Christ, offered freely and received in faith. In a moment, we are assured that God wins, not sin. But there's more. By grace, we are not just saved from sin; we are saved for something new. The Holy Spirit empowers us to live as beacons of new creation in a world longing for redemption.

Humanity is not bad—we are made in God's image and treasured beyond measure. But because of sin, we fall into patterns that wound our neighbors, our world, and our own lives. Grace meets us there, not to abandon us as sinners, but to heal, restore, and send us into the world as bearers of God's renewing love.



In the Event of Inclement Weather

I know that this is usually the spot in the Weekender where you find an Inspired section. This weekend, though, the weather feels like the hotter topic. Or maybe the colder one. I wanted to take a moment to explain how decisions like this are made and how we would communicate any future weather-related closures.

As I write this, I honestly have no idea what the weather will do. Some of you may be reading this from home, snowed in, or you might be reading it warm in your pew in the sanctuary. Yes, I know some of you will say your pew in the sanctuary is never warm :-) The point is either outcome feels equally possible. Either way, I wanted to offer some clarity about how these decisions are made now and in the future.

If we receive snow or ice over the weekend, I will reach out to our staff along with some of our nominated and elected lay leaders. I will ask for their input on whether we should remain open or close for Sunday activities. When possible, I will also check in with fellow clergy in the area to see what they are planning. While I do make the final decision, it is always done after listening carefully to others. If we ever choose to cancel, we will notify our entire email list and post updates on our social media. We also ask that you help spread the word by calling or texting friends.

I also want to be clear that these decisions are generally made on an all-or-nothing basis. I know it has become more common for churches to livestream services when the weather is bad instead of gathering in person. My own philosophy is this. If it is not safe enough to welcome the congregation, then it is not safe to ask our staff, choir, AV team, and volunteers to come in just to livestream. On the other hand, if it is safe enough for them to do that work, then it is safe enough for the congregation to decide for themselves whether to attend.

Even if there is only light snow and we remain open for worship, I encourage you to use your best judgment. You know the route from your home to the church, and you know your own comfort level with driving and walking in poor conditions. If you are unsure, please err on the side of caution.

That said, I never take cancelling worship lightly. If it is safe, we will be open and ready to welcome you.
