What can I do? Rev. Dr. Thomas Martin

That's a question that often seems on the tip of my tongue these days. In the face of so much uncertainty, I wonder, "What can I do to help the situation?" Maybe you ask that question too. I am humbled, however, that whenever there is a request, this congregation responds.

For instance, since we started the drive-thru prayer and pantry for Fayette Samaritans, you have responded bringing food and necessities. When we requested 50 dozen cookies for our SafeHouse Outreach mission night, you responded with over 170 dozen cookies. (We have frozen some of them and will use them next time and find other ways to share them). When there is an ask, you as a church have responded.

While that question "What can I do?" looms, we have seen ways that we can respond. In our worship services throughout Lent, we talked about ways we can uphold the ministries of the church with our prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness. This congregation once again continues to step up with the prayers, notes, service, and giving — even when we cannot be present together.

In the coming days, we will be preparing for ways in which we can gather together safely. We must be aware of precautions. As we outline those and identify them, we will be asking. The first thing we will ask is for masks. When we return, everyone will be required to wear a mask in church. Many of you have been graciously making them for others. If you have the ability and skill to make masks, that is our first ask: "ask for masks." The plan is to have them available for people to use on Sunday mornings and have as their own. What we don't want when we return is for someone to come to church, forget a mask, and not be welcomed in.

If you cannot sew, there will be other asks that we will be making ranging from anything to volunteering time to clean to additional worship and pew duties. If you can sew, please let us know. Remember, as of now, the goal is to return to in-person worship on June 28. There is a lot to do and plan between now and then so stay tuned. In the meantime, as we ask the question "What can I do?", I'll answer with this: "Uphold the church with your prayers, gifts, service, and witness until we can be present together again."
