

### On the learning curve

One of my favorite movies growing up was the movie "Hook" starring Robin Williams. The plot is that Peter Pan grows up, begins a life, marries, has kids, and has forgotten how to fly. When Captain Hook feels emptiness because he has no one to fight, he kidnaps the grown Pan's kids and takes them back to Never Never Land. Peter has to go back and relearn how to fly, how to imagine, and in one of the movie's most climactic moments--how to crow. He has to remember who he was—as he lost himself but at the same time fight for who he has become.



To me, this is a great illustration of our present circumstances. During these times of distancing, we have moved into a different realm and reality of living. We miss the good ol' days. We miss the things we used to do. We want things to go back to the way they were.

However, we also have the opportunity to look at the good work that we have been doing in our lives, homes, church, and world. Even as things have gotten harder and more difficult and knowing that the road ahead is uncertain, we have adapted, loved, and served in ways we did not know we could five months ago. Change has forced us to change. It is not all bad.

Where we go from here is up to us. Much like the adult Peter Pan, we have to relearn some things that we may have forgotten along the way. Maybe it's taking the time to love God and love our neighbors as ourselves (Mt. 22:37-38). Maybe it's taking the time to recognize another's needs and humble ourselves (Ph. 2:3). Maybe it's finding new ways to slow our anger or our speech (James 1:19). Whatever the learning curve may be, like the adult Peter Pan, we are asked to remember the things that we learned along the way that have allowed us to live and grow into the people God would have us to be. May we relearn to fly. May we relearn what it is to imagine. May we relearn what it means to crow.




