
Over the next two weeks in worship, we will continue to look at the theme of disruptions. Last week, we read from the book of Isaiah and began to understand the life that surrounded his time. We learned the historical significance of the time in which the book of Isaiah was compiled and saw that life changed, empires rose and fell, but the love of God called people to look to a better future.

The role of a prophet is to hold the people of God accountable for their actions and behaviors. The role of a prophet is to help people deepen their relationship with God and neighbor. The role of a prophet is to always look toward a better day.

In the verses from Isaiah 25 we read last week in scripture, the only time the prophet looks back is when the prophet is searching for the goodness of God throughout all the trying times. That is a good lesson for us. When we look back, do we do so to assign blame or do we find the threads of God's goodness?

Isaiah looks for the goodness of God. In verse 4, we hear exactly what God has been up to: *"For you have been a refuge to the poor, a refuge to the needy in their distress, a shelter from the rainstorm and a shade from the heat."*

My guess is that for many of us, these are still uncertain times. Many people are feeling the pressure and worry of job security. Many are feeling anxiety around the spread of the virus because of family members with pre-existing conditions and others have so much empathy for their neighbor, they are able to feel the worry of their fellow brothers and sisters. Whatever the worry or anxiety we face, we are sure and certain of God's presence in our lives. My hope for us, as we move through this unique time together, is that we won't wait until everything is over to learn about God's prevenient grace. May we learn to praise and give thanks to God for being a present help in time of need.

Who is this service designed to reach? *"As always God's church is open and continuously here for anyone and everyone! This particular service has opportunities for worship and participation by all ages ... children, youth, and adults ... and for expression of many spiritual gifts ... liturgy and scripture readers, music, hospitality ... so many ways to simply be together in worship and participate on a regular or occasional basis."*



What are your hopes for this time? *"I want us all to meet God and meet other people. It's important to be around people you know well and people you don't know at all in order to ultimately see and experience God's lovingkindness. This setting gives us space to get together and share."*
