God's presence in disruption Rev. Dr. Thomas Martin

Over the last three weeks in worship, the sermons have focused on the word *disruption*. Three weeks ago we read from the book of Isaiah. Isaiah was composed over a 200 year period. It was intended for people whose lives were disrupted by forces beyond their control. God's presence was constant.

Two weeks ago, we read from the book of Exodus. Exodus is a book of disruption and salvation. It is a book of human frailty and God's faithfulness. It is our story. In Exodus we read how Moses requested to see God's face, but instead of showing Moses his face, God let Moses behold his glory because no one has ever seen the face of God and lived.



This past Sunday, we acknowledged that the only way out of disruption is to move into the places that God has already prepared for us in ministry. He does so by making the rules so simple to follow. Love God. Love others. If we want to live as Christ's disciples, we have to ask ourselves "Is everything that I'm doing helping me love God and love my neighbor better?" For me it's an annoying question because if I'm honest, not everything that I do helps me love God and love my neighbor better.

The point is not to make us feel bad or guilt us into following Christ, but rather to joyfully move into the moments of disruption. For in the disruption we find that God's presence is there. It was there from the beginning when God spoke into the chaos of creation and brought out order. It was with Moses and God's people in Exodus. It was spoken as a word of comfort through the prophets. It was there when Christ was baptized and it is here for us today. For our church, I pray that we would acknowledge the disruption and in the same breath give thanks to God that God's love remains steadfast in the disruption.
