Sowing and Reaping Rev. Dr. Thomas Martin

This is a week of gratitude. While there are things which we can all complain about (and I am prone to complaining quite a bit these days), there is much for which we can give thanks. Sometimes, gratitude can be very surprising.

Many of you who read this know that we have a benevolence program here at the church that takes the above and beyond giving of the congregation and works together with other local agencies to assist those in our community who find themselves in need. We do this without pressure or threat. We do it generously. We do it responsibly. We do it because it's what the people of God do. We do it together. It's a way of showing thanks.

For the past two weeks, a person who we helped earlier this year has come into the office with cash in hand because they wanted to sow where they reaped. They wanted to pay it forward. This person wanted to give back. The

total amount back to the church is almost equal to the amount that was gifted, no questions asked. We have prayed together. We have shared stories of family and holidays. That is gratitude. That is thankfulness. It is not coerced. It is not forced. This person is living a life of gratitude for what a group of people have done in a life.

I wonder if we might have that same spirit of sowing where we reaped? I wonder if those like me who are prone to complain are as quick to give thanks? I wonder how much better the world would be if we could adjust *"have to"* to *"get to"*? What a difference it would be if a simple thing, like, "I have to do laundry" shifted into "I get to do laundry because it means I have more than one pair of clothes. It means I have the means, sometimes in my own house, to do laundry." Laundry is a silly, simple example. I hope not just this week, but every day we may be people who say, "We get to share life together because of the love of God, the grace of Christ, and the power of the Holy Spirit."

May our lives be filled with gratitude that sows from where we reap.
