The rhythm of compassion

There is something to be learned in the rhythm of Jesus' life. So often we read that Jesus performed some amazing miracle or healing or offered some profound teaching and then he went away by himself to pray or to rest. In living his life and doing the work of God, he creates a rhythm of mission and rest.

Over and over again in Matthew, Mark and Luke we read how Jesus had compassion on those around him. He balances his mission, (to preach good news to the poor, to proclaim release to



the prisoners and recovery of sight to the blind, to liberate the oppressed, and to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor) with rest and always covered his daily activities with compassion. Compassion for himself and compassion for others.

"When Jesus arrived and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them because they were like sheep without a shepherd. Then he began to teach them many things." Mark 6:34

In the rhythm of Jesus life, he teaches us that:

Mission without rest is unhealthy. Rest without mission is unhelpful. Rest and mission without compassion is unholy.

It is this rhythm of compassion that breaks down the walls that divide us. It is this rhythm of compassion that builds a dwelling place for God, a place of transformation. It is this rhythm of compassion that brings about the peace of Christ.

May we embrace the compassionate rhythm of life and may the peace of Christ be with us all.




Blessing of Backpacks (briefcases, Chromebooks+) Sunday, August 1 at 11 a.m.



Tuesdays: 199 lunches/230 sandwiches












A note from Virginia Pope FFUMC 2021 Summer Lunch Coordinator:
