



Stay Curious

There are lots of different things we can glean from life experience. Learning is always happening. A quote from Walt Whitman has been recently made more popular with the TV show "Ted Lasso." The quote is, "Stay curious, not judgmental."

What a great perspective on life! What great wisdom for our day and age. What a great way to summarize most of James' teachings in the Bible. It's also a great summary for how Jesus reprimands his disciples and those closest to him. It seems to me, at least, that anytime Jesus gets most angry or reprimanding it is against those who have made up their minds. Those people selling and charging for profit in the temple judged that turning a profit was more



important than growing close to God. The Pharisee judged that he was more holy than the tax collector. The disciples were trying to judge who would be greatest in the kingdom of heaven.

We judge. It is part of our human nature. The trick, perhaps, to avoid the trapping of living a judgmental lifestyle is to be curious. That is the turn of phrase with Mr. Whitman's quote.

But what does the Bible have to say to us about judging? Jesus says, "Judge not lest ye be judged (Matthew 7:1)." Paul writes, "Therefore you have no excuse, whoever you are, when you judge others; for in passing judgment on another you condemn yourself, because you, the judge, are doing the very same things (Romans 2:1)."

The hope for us, the Good News, is that God judges us but does so by our hearts. "For the Lord does not see as mortals see; they look on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart (1 Samuel 16:7)." Maybe it is time for us to live as God is the only judge of mortals. Maybe that will free us for joyful living. Maybe if we truly leave the judging to God, it might free us to be curious about what it means to love God and to love our neighbors, rather than passing judgment on them. Stay curious.




