The problem with change

If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation. — 2 Corinthians 5:17

I remember somewhere in 5th or 6th grade learning about the process of sublimation. Up until that point, I had understood that matter is what stuff is made of. I had understood that that stuff can either be qualified as a liquid, solid, or gas. I had seen the process watching ice cubes turn into water turn into vapor on the hot plate in elementary school. But the word sublimation was new to me.

A refresher: Sublimation is the process of changing from a solid to a gas without passing through an intermediate liquid phase. In other words, it changes rapidly and goes from one end to the other so quickly it skips a step.

Change is hard. Drastic changes are harder.

Maybe that's why the disciples are so reluctant to hear Jesus' words about death and resurrection while he is still with them. Change doesn't seem real, no matter how much we know it is coming or how much we anticipate it.

The problem with change is that it reminds us that we are not in control. I think of Jesus' parables of the yeast. When you add yeast to bread, it changes and grows whether you are watching it or not. You cannot see the yeast working with the naked eye, but you can see the results of it.

The Christian life involves change. Sometimes it is quick and sudden growth like sublimation when we are justified by God's grace and find redemption. Sometimes, like yeast, it is slowly and gradually empowered by God's sanctifying grace. Sometimes it happens without us even knowing, like God's prevenient grace.

The thing we must all accept about being followers of Christ is that change is going to happen. But the good news is that if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation. The old has gone and the new has come. May we learn to thank God for the change, for we are all new creations in Christ.

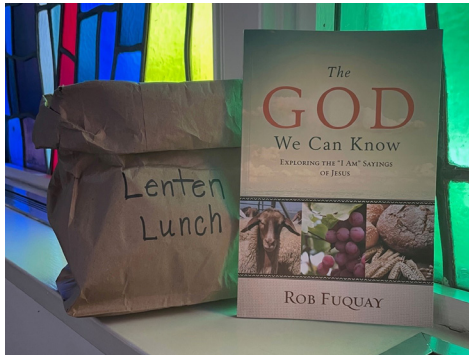

Interested in Biblical travel to Egypt?

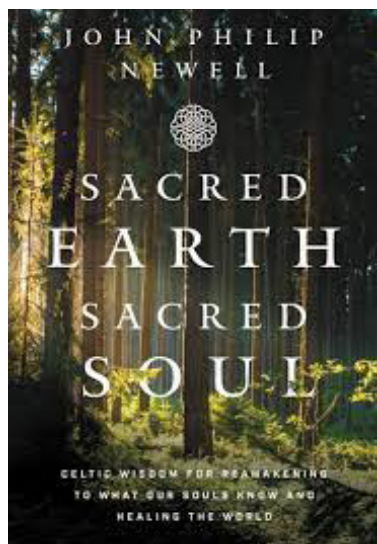

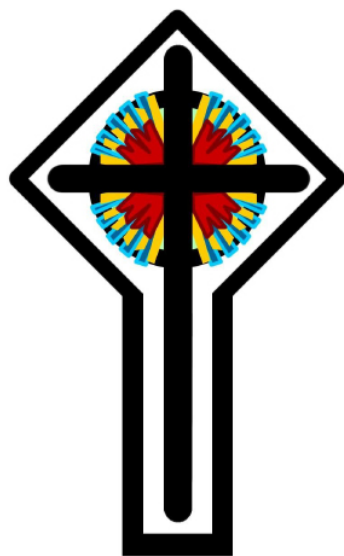

iRespond: Creative steps in spiritual formation

Experience is the best teacher, and our children are getting plenty of it as they learn ways we respond to God's grace. **iRespond** is a creative, intentional effort to move students through expressions of loyalty to Christ promised in the United Methodist membership vows. In small groups, the students are exposed to ways to be faithful in prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness through five touchstones: **iPray**, **iLove**, **iGive**, **iServe**, and **iLead**.

Just look at some examples from the last few weeks. The third and fourth grade students explored our worship spaces and the importance of being present in an **iLove** segment. Kindergarten and first graders practiced prayer in creative ways with flowers, bubbles, art supplies, Play-Doh and more through **iPray**. First-time acolyte servants in third through fifth grade are learning their important big kid opportunity in worship participation through **iServe** sessions.

As these young disciples move toward Confirmation, they'll be prepared for important personal decisions to come in their faith journey. And it looks like they'll have a good time along the way!
