Parent Corner

Did you know...?

Helping our children grow in their understanding and love of God is an important goal of FFUMC Kids Ministries. We intentionally offer opportunities for children to be active participants in the life of the church, learn stories from the Bible, and explore daily practices that help guide their spiritual journeys. One of the pathways we use to help children in this endeavor is our "iRespond to God's Grace" series. When you see a logo, like our iServe logo associated with our Summer Lunch mission work, you know that event is structured in a way to help your child respond to God's grace through service. Other iRespond touch-points include: iLove (worship), iPray (prayer), iLead (witness), iGive (gifts). Be sure to be on the look out for these logos and help your child experience these important ways to grow in their faith.

Sunday School:

During the month of June, our summer Sunday school series, will introduce our children to Pentecost and how people in the early church experienced the Holy Spirit. In July they will learn more about how, and why, early believers praised God. Each lesson has a take-home sheet that summarizes the Bible story and includes a family spiritual practice activity. Ask your child what they learned each Sunday morning and experience the joy of growing in faith together.

Save the Date:

PARENT GUILT: The Problem With Perfection

I participated in a wonderful youth group when I was in high school. My youth leader talked about the importance of praying every day, reading Scripture, and living a moral life. I began setting my alarm 20 minutes early so that I could start my day off right. I'd pray and read the Bible. Unfortunately, this time quickly turned into the newest way I wasn't good enough. I would oversleep 10 minutes and beat myself up all through the remaining 10 minutes. I resented these practices and I resented myself for not being a better person.

I have battled the pervasiveness of perfectionism for a long time. Our culture constantly pushes us to be the best. It's hard to imagine that God isn't looking for us to be perfect when it seems like everything else implicitly teaches us that, in order to be worthy people, we must be perfect people. One of the things I have to remind myself of when I get caught in the cycle of perfectionism is this: I don't have to do things perfectly to be a good, deserving person. In fact, striving to be perfect distracts from a true relationship with God and with God's people.

As a children's minister and mom, I have talked with several parents about this very thing showing up in our parenting. We feel guilty for all the ways we aren't "perfect" at helping our kids be good people of faith. Have you fallen prey to this perfectionism? Take a breath and remember the following things:

- 1. There is no one right way to be a teacher of faith for your child. Free yourself from the example you have in your mind about how raising your child to be a disciple of Christ should look. The first image of God a child has is based on your care of him or her. Hold, listen, play, read, and be present with your child. This act of being together creates a strong, loving, God-filled experience for you both.
- 2. There is not a specific amount of time you are required to "do faith."
 Susanna Wesley, the mother of John and Charles Wesley (the founders of the Methodist movement), believed that God was present in everything. She washed dishes and was with God. She cooked food and was with God. Instead of worrying about setting aside a special time, be attentive to the love that surrounds your family all the time. Use your time at the kitchen table, in the car, at bath time, and at bedtime for prayers and stories and fellowship.
- 3. You can say you don't know. There are no right answers to the many questions and wonderings faith brings. I encourage your family to embrace the mystery of God. Saying, "I don't know; let's learn about it together" is one of the greatest gifts you can give your child. It encourages imagination and opens your child to discovering how God is moving in the world.

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
